The economic boom of the 1990s helped reduce poverty and raise salaries for disadvantaged workers. But inequalities still persist. Our economists can provide your audience insights into the economic roller coaster – from the benefits of the late '90s boom, to the costs of the lingering downturn.

THE MORE THINGS CHANGE...

In the late 90s Hispanic and black families saw their median income increase, their poverty rates fall to a historic lows, and home ownership climb to historic highs. Single mothers on welfare entered a strong labor market and dramatically reshaped their income.

THE MORE THEY STAY THE SAME

In spite of these historic gains, close to a third of black children remain in poverty, the wage gap between women and men remains the same as a decade ago, and the number of Hispanic males earning poverty-level wages has actually grown to almost 38%.
